Abstract of Program		The Rohingya crisis represents a major humanitarian and legal dilemma in South Asia, with Bangladesh bearing the burden of hosting over one million forcibly displaced Rohingya since 2017. This research critically explores whether, and to what extent, Myanmar owes compensation to Bangladesh under international law. The study examines Myanmar's systematic persecution of the Rohingya—characterized by ethnic cleansing, forced displacement, and alleged acts of genocide—as breaches of international obligations under the Genocide Convention (1948), the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR), and customary international law. Grounded in the doctrine of state responsibility, particularly the International Law Commission's Articles on Responsibility of States for Internationally Wrongful Acts (ARSIWA), this study argues that Myanmar's conduct has triggered legal consequences that warrant reparations. The paper assesses the legal foundation for Bangladesh's claim to compensation, drawing upon precedents such as the Bosnian Genocide Case and the ongoing Gambia v. Myanmar proceedings before the International Court of Justice (ICJ). It also critiques the failure of regional frameworks, such as ASEAN's non-intervention policy, in preventing or mitigating mass atrocity crimes. Bangladesh's economic, social, and environmental damages due to the refugee influx are measurable and actionable under international claims mechanisms. The paper concludes that Myanmar's responsibility is legally sound and that Bangladesh should strategically pursue reparation through international litigation, diplomatic engagement, or multilateral pressure. The study further recommends legal and policy strategies to formalize Bangladesh's claim within a globally recognized justice framework, promoting accountability and long-term regional stability.
